Thanks to all who helped, and congratulations to Dave Pike for his skilled leadership as Chairman.

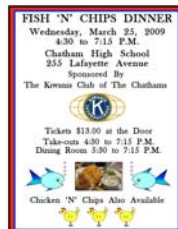

Governor Dean Konner, speaking to representatives of our club and others, about his theme, *Kiwanis Needs Your Help*, at the Skylands of Randolph, At his first official meeting with the clubs of Division 10, he reported that the

NJ District was one of only two Districts in the country to have a net gain of members last year.

He then turned to his emphasis on sponsored youth. There are new K-Kids and Builders Clubs. New Jersey Key

Clubs have 12,000 members, and Circle K Clubs are growing. In the NJ District, there are now 99 Kiwanis Clubs, and another is being planned for Flemington.

The Kiwanis-family of clubs in NJ have made a commitment to contribute \$500,000. to the Childrens Specialized Hospital. Our President-elect, Rich Behling, presented to Governor Konner a \$250. check for the Kiwanis Foundation.

Former Lt. Gov. Nancy Boucher reported that the Morris County Aktion Club, located in Den-

ville, was a co-sponsor of the evening's dinner meeting. They provided the balloon centerpieces, and the Club received the proceeds of the 50/50. Morristown club member, Steve McKinley, won the drawing, and gave his share to the Aktion Club, which we sponsor. This organization, for adults living with disabilities, has long struggled with its members' needs for transportation. Nancy suggested to Steve that perhaps his limousine company could help with their need for rides to attend meetings and other club activities. When he gave a positive response,

March 10, School District of the Chathams

“Our school district is one of the finest”, Jim O’Niel, Superintendent of Schools

Jim passed out a flier on finances and the school budget. It lists the costs per pupil for the last full year, and it compares the Chatham cost of #11,807. with Madison’s at \$13,122., Summit at \$13,097. Berkley Hts. At \$12.389. and Princeton at\$16,834. Expressing pride in the district and its high school, Jim said that 80 to 85% of graduates go to the top three categories of colleges. One reason for this success is that “our residents value education”. He also said that the school consolidation of a few years ago has paid dividends- we have saved \$850,000. in salaries- and the budget increase this year is the smallest since consolidation.

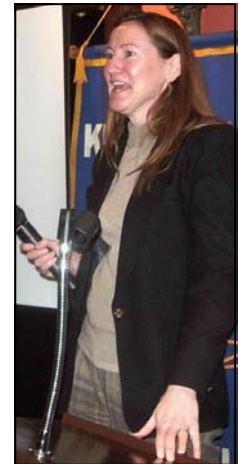

ECLC: First Year for PRIDE

“The new program that started in September is working extremely well”, Heather Alonge, Kiwanis member and Director of Development for ECLC schools.

ECLC, an organization for the developmentally disabled, has long recognized that its goals for students – *to have friends, to be involved in meaningful and positive activities, and to experience success in their efforts* – do not end with graduation. As a result, a new day program has been developed, called PRIDE. It is designed for those graduates who are not ready for competitive support employment. There are now 19 adults attending classes in the new center on Passaic Avenue. They learn real life skills by taking part in activities that promote eventual integration into mainstream society. They practice daily living skills, explore career and volunteer options, and engage in community-based activities that emphasize personal fitness and health.

According to Heather, the ECLC Foundation welcomes contributions of funds and/or equipment for the new facility. They plan to increase the number of clients to 25 by July. The PRIDE program will operate year around. Visitors and volunteers are welcome. ECLC’s website is www.eclcofnj.org.
