Panosian and Villars Awarded Chatham Kiwanis Scholarships

At the June 19, 2007 Chatham High School graduation ceremony, Alison Panosian and Melissa Villars were honored for receiving this year's two \$8,000 Chatham Kiwanis Scholarships. The recipients will receive \$2,000 per year for four years while earning their bachelor's degrees. Panosian will continue her education at Bryn Mawr College and Villars will attend Carleton College, a small liberal arts school in Minnesota. Panosian has been active in her church and Villars was a member of the excellent CHS volleyball team.

The scholarships are made available every year by the Kiwanis Club of the Chathams for two members of the Chatham High School graduating class who plan to continue their education. Scholarships are awarded for high academic standing, leadership, good citizenship, and participation in school and community activities.

Dick Haenschen, chairman of the Kiwanis Scholarship selection committee indicated that all of the many applicants were highly qualified, making the selection process very difficult. Other committee members included Marjorie Ahrens, Mary Lloyd, and Diane O'Brien.

Since 1978 The Kiwanis Club of the Chathams has awarded two scholarships a year valued at \$6000 each. Three years ago, the club increased the amount to \$8000 for each new scholarship winner. The club disburses one fourth of the total scholarship amount every year to each recipient and their college while they are enrolled in a degree program. The club will distribute a total of \$16000 this year to eight scholarship recipients. Current recipients, in addition to Freshmen Panosian and Villars are: Sophomores Lauren Gallart (Stevens Institute of Technology) and Derin Solu (University of Virginia); Juniors Merideth Braun (Boston College) and Christopher Chodaczek (Georgetown University); and Seniors Katherine Cronin (Columbia University) and Eileen Gibbons (Penn State University). Year 2003 Scholarship winners Elizabeth Poggi (Georgetown University) and Alex Yu (Northwestern University) graduated this year.

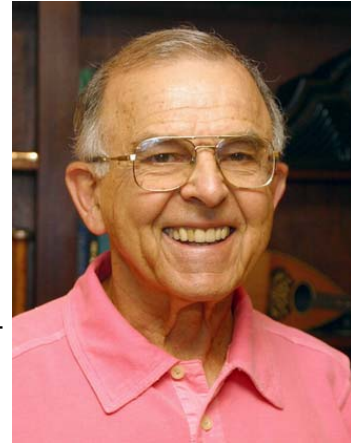
Dick Mann Inducted. Dave Pike, Sponsor.
