Bailey Brower Jr, Public Servant: Twp. Committeeman and Deputy Mayor

At our April 21 meeting, Bailey told us, "I've had 13 years with the Chatham Township government, and I've worked with good, responsible people. There is a wealth of character and history in this town." Among his suggestions for an improved system is a *jointure* of the township and borough, where he considers the *mayor and council* form of government, with is popularly elected mayor, to be superior to that of the Township Committee, the oldest form of government in NJ. In the meantime, he recommends the sharing of services, such as the police, public works and fire departments.

He perceives some threats to the stability and viability of the town, both local and regional. They include the education costs (61% of town budget), unfunded mandates such as the sewer system (a "town-breaker"), and the state-mandated pensions. "The biggest threats are mandates from the State Council on Affordable Housing (COAH)".

Bailey has a warm feeling for the history of Chatham. He can remember milk producers on Noe Avenue, and coal sidings near the railroad tracks. He was impressed by last year's *great reunion*. May 12: Our Annual Meeting: Election of New Officers and Directors

Leadership positions for the next Kiwanis Year (Oct.'09 to Sep.2010) will be open for floor nominations and voting on May 12. Doug Bryant recently announced the report of the Nominating Committee: Mary Anne Maloney has been nominated for Vice President, John Eyre, Marty Sheahehay and Bill Williams for Directors (class of '12) and Betty Anne Keat to fill the unexpired Director term of Mary Anne Maloney (class of '11). According to our by-laws, the Vice President, President-Elect and President will move up one step, with Doug becoming Past President. At the Annual Meeting, floor nominations will be called. after which the voting will proceed. All members present will be eligible to vote in this annual election..

April 14. Dr Jill Cermele, Drew Professor, “Violence has consequences for everyone, and the cost is high”, Dr. Cermele, an Associate Professor of Psychology, described the impact of violence on our communities and our country. The costs range from emergency care to nightmares, reliving an incident, depression, and the possibility of future violence. Every year over two and a half million incidents of violence occur. While women are often victims of sexual violence at the hands of someone they know, men are more subject to attacks by strangers, and fatalities are frequent.

Jill told us that the common advice, *don't fight back*, can be wrong, and can result in greater injury. In her woman's self-defense courses, she teaches that resistance can work. Faced with a dangerous situation, the potential victim should act assertively: yell, lash out with feet, hands, or elbows, and run away. “Resist *before* you get injured!”

The website, *Safety tips for women*, at

www.thenonprofits.com.atm, lists many bits of advice that Jill gives to her college students. Her program, *Impact self defense training*, was started by martial arts practitioners. Jill helps women to learn to fight when they are afraid, realize that fear will not paralyze them, and develop a high sense of self determination. The program was endorsed by Thomas Kean while he was president of Drew, and 150 members of the faculty and staff have attended her classes.

She recently received a grant to bring her program to young women, and to young men. This summer she will conduct classes for teens at Neighborhood House in Morristown. In addition to using physical training in her courses, she emphasizes the use of verbal commands as well. Bystanders may want to help, but often don't know what to do. In a firm voice, tell them to, “***call the police!***” or “***call an ambulance!***”

Jill is also collecting stories of encounters with situations that involved real or potential danger. She welcomes personal stories for her research, for they may help future victims. She may be contacted at jcermiele@drew.edu.

April 28, Venturing, a new Scouting program.

“**Venturers are encouraged to think outside the box, to be creative**”, Jim Kowalak, Scout executive for Venturing in our area. This new program, for high school and beyond (ages 14 through 20), provides positive experiences to help young people mature and become responsible adults. Jim described how members learn by doing, and by teaching others. It differs from previous Scouting programs in that it has no ranks (first or second class, etc), and uses the term *Crew* instead of *Troop*. Members of a Crew make decisions on programming, whether to wear uniforms, and whether the Crew will be co-ed or single gender.

Leadership skills are encouraged, and everyone gets a chance to be a leader. Adults are *advisors* rather than *scout masters*. Programs for monthly outings range from *high adventure* to *sports, arts, and hobbies*, and they are planned by the members. They are usually full of fun and challenge.

The leadership experiences, technical skills and personal growth acquired in venturing are designed to develop mature judgment, self discipline and the ability to encourage others.
