DIANE O'BRIEN—The growth of technology, and the creativity of our younger members

As a follow-up to the 100th Anniversary Celebration on June 9 (see June Crier, p.4), librarian and club member Diane O'Brien shared stories about the library at our July 31. meeting. She recounted its long history and final move to the present location, including its many improvements in space, programming and technology.

In closing her talk, Diane shared with us the writings of two young people in response to her challenge, "What will our library be like in 100 years?" The first response is a story by Katie Collington called "Futuristic Library": In the Chatham Library of 2107, everything floats, creating many levels, but there is only one floor. Members walk on Hover Paths, and reach the bookshelves with Hover Chairs. They can call a book, magnetically, by using a Book Clicker – this is how nothing gets mixed up. All this is amazing, but the best thing is a Reality Room in which you live the book! One can become any book character and journey in their footsteps, or create a character and join the others, or, like a ghost, join the story without anyone knowing. To do all this, a Book Chip is purchased. As our club mourns his loss, we remember a friend, a good community member, and a leader of his family. He knew many in the club, and in recent years was especially close with those golfers with whom he was a frequent player.

It was fortunate that I was able to attend the viewing at Bradley’s on the evening of August eighth. for there I could express our condolences to Margaret and to their daughter, Kristen, and her husband, Dean, and to their son, Jeffrey and his wife, Shelley. During a time of remembrance, his brother-in-law, Trevor, husband of his sister, Brenda,

spoke of Roger as a big brother, a mentor, a tour guide, and a true family man, who called weekly, and loved to play practical jokes.

Also sharing their admiration for Roger were Leanna Brown, former state senator and columnist, who spoke of his sincerity, honesty and love of his town, Margaret’s brother Arman Rubbert, and Leo Bael, friend and co-worker at AT&T, who described him as very cooperative and knowledgeable, a good fisherman and a dedicated member of the Air Force. He predicted that “he has now reported to the Supreme Commander for a new assignment.”

The formal funeral service was held the next day at Grace Lutheran Church in Livingston. Rich Behling described the service as very moving, and was impressed by a final ceremony that was performed by the military escort . After the bugler played “Taps”, the flag covering the casket was removed, carefully folded, and presented to Margaret with traditional ceremony.

We will miss Roger, and trust that his spirit of friendship will remain with us for a long time..
