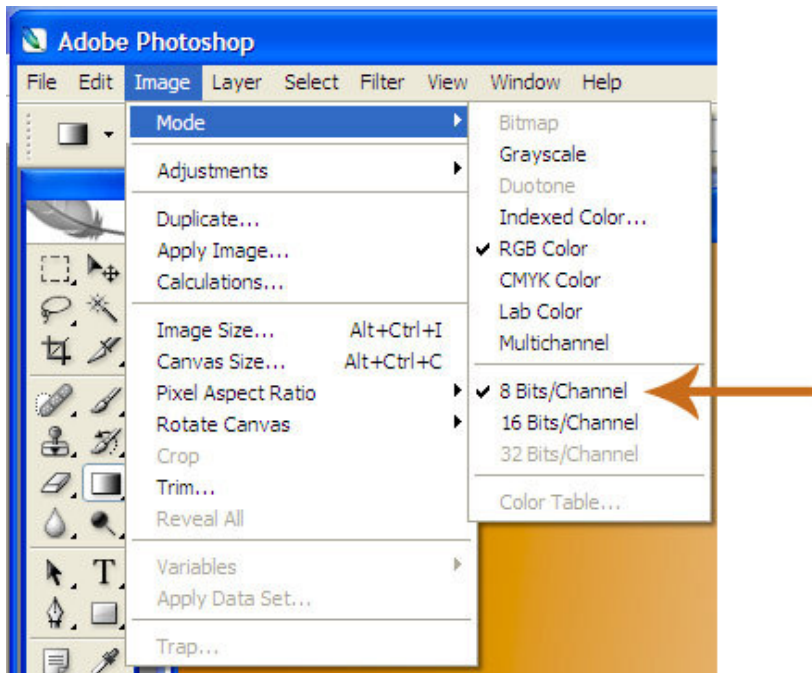


How to dimension and save your files for the Digital Projection Competition

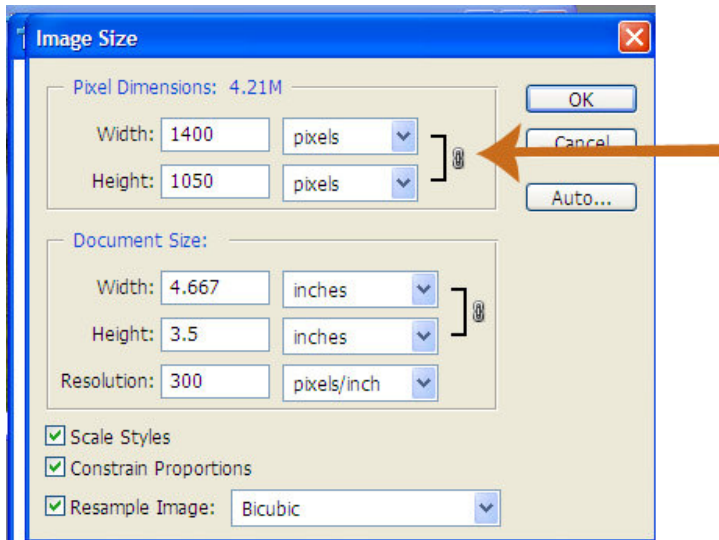
These instructions apply to Adobe Photoshop versions 5.5 or newer. Most other photo editing software has similar capabilities. These instructions apply to any digital image be it captured digitally or a scanned image.

Once you are happy with your entry please make sure that you **SAVE** your entry. You can always get back to your original file if necessary.

To prepare your entry for the competition make sure your entry is 8bits per channel by clicking at 8bits/channel:



Next resize your image using **Image>Image Size**. In the window that shows up make sure you your units are pixels and that the two measures are shown locked by clicking Constrain Proportions in the lower left side of the window. Make your resolution 300 pixels/inch.



Landscape or Square Form Factor Entries

Change the width to 1400 pixels. Do not change the other dimension as the program will calculate it. However if the result for the height is larger than 1050 pixels change the height to 1050 pixels and let the program calculate the width, which should be smaller than 1400 pixels.

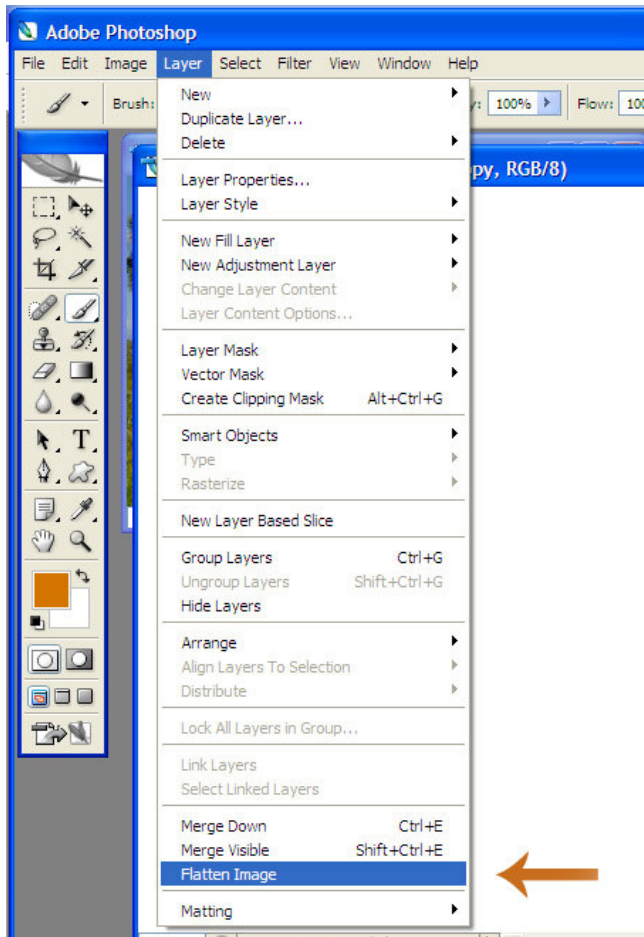
Portrait Form Factor Entries

Change the height to 1050 pixels. Verify that the width is smaller than 1400 pixels.

It is now time to save your entry. First flatten your image if necessary using

Layer>Flatten Image

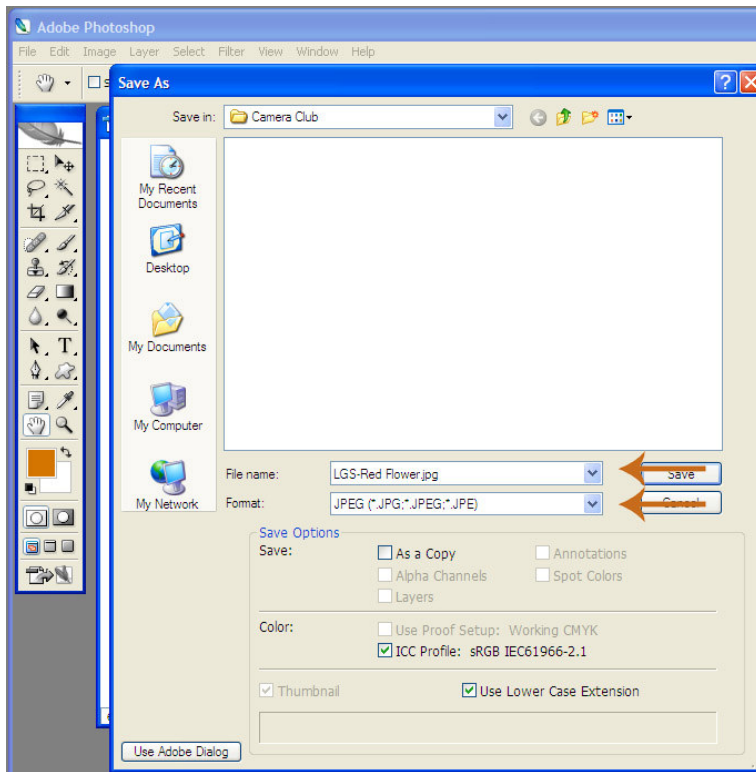
If the Flatten Image is greyed-out then your entry has already been flattened.



Now go to **File>Save as**

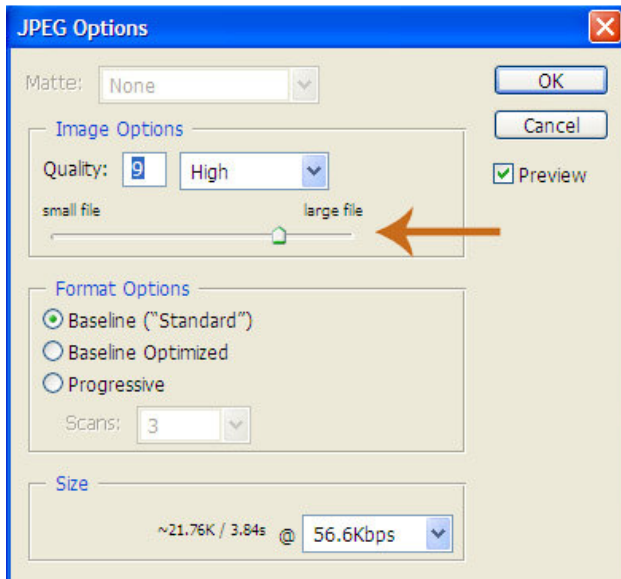
In the window that appears, in the File Format click at the down arrow head to the right of that field and look for:

JPEG(*.JPG, *.JPEG, *.JPE)



In the File Name type your file name as defined in the guidelines, i.e.: LG-Red Flower and then click at Save. Make sure you notice in which directory you saved your entry.

In the next window when prompted move the slider to the right or the left until you get at least a GOOD quality then click OK.



You are done. This should create a file that meets the requirements of the 6 C's guidelines.

You only need to "burn" it using the software in your computer to burn a CD or attach it to an e-mail using the attach function in your mail application to your club responsible member.
