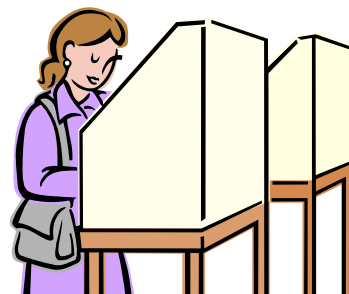

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Introduction

This public service endeavor, provided by the League of Women Voters of Arlington, is designed to present voters with information to help them make informed decisions about the candidates in the Town election on Saturday April 4, 2009. In compiling the information for this Voters Guide, the League sent a questionnaire to all candidates whose names were provided by Arlington's Town Clerk. Candidates appear as they are printed on the ballot.

The League of Women Voters of Arlington formulated the wording of all questions asked. If replies exceeded the word limits, answers were cut by the League to fit the required limit. All candidates were informed of this process in the mailing. Replies are also formatted to fit within the space constraints of this document. The candidate responses were not edited for grammar or spelling.

Candidates Night

Candidates Night will be held on Thursday, March 26, 2009 in the Town Hall Auditorium. The doors open at 7:30 to give concerned citizens time to chat informally with candidates and town meeting members. The forum will start promptly at 8 pm. The event will also be cablecast. Check with your cable provider for broadcast times. Cards will be available at the back of Town Hall for questions for the candidates. Please read the procedure below.

Screening Questions For Candidates Night

1. Questions are asked of all the candidates and should not single out certain individuals.
2. Questions of policy should pertain to the specific powers of the office sought and the level of government it is in.
3. Questions should be direct, clear and avoid language that introduces a bias or unduly narrows the scope of the question.
4. Questions selected should include those asked numerous times — as an indication of general interest — provided they meet the other criteria and have not already been covered in the Voters Guide or other well-known sources.
5. Questions of competence and character should be general enough so that a range of experiences could reasonably be cited as evidence.
6. Questions of opinion should be relevant to important issues of public policy likely to come up for someone elected to the position sought.
7. The words of the questioner are preferred even when shortening or editing is needed.

Ballot Questions

This year, the Ballot for town elections will have four questions for voters to answer. The questions will appear on the ballot like this:

Question 1.

Shall the Board of Selectmen be authorized to grant an additional 5 licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages to be drunk on the premises in restaurants and function rooms having a seating capacity of not less than 50 persons?

Summary of Question 1.

At the request of the Board of Selectmen, the 2008 Annual Town Meeting voted to ask the Legislature to authorize placement of this question on the 2009 annual election ballot, which the Legislature did. This ballot question asks the electorate to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue up to five additional licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages to be consumed on the premises in restaurants or function rooms that can seat at least 50 people. Currently, the Board of Selectmen is authorized to issue up to ten licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages to be consumed on the premises in restaurants or function rooms. To date, the Board of Selectmen has issued all ten of these licenses. A “yes” vote on this ballot question would authorize, but not require, the Board of Selectmen to issue up to five additional licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages to be consumed on the premises in restaurants or function rooms that can seat at least 50 people for a total of 15 such licenses. A “no” vote would make no change in existing licensing of sales of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises. This question does not affect package stores.

Question 2. This is a non-binding question.

Do you favor allowing the service of alcoholic beverages without food in licensed restaurants?

Summary of Question 2.

This is a non-binding public opinion advisory question placed on the ballot by majority vote of the Board of Selectmen. Currently, the Board of Selectmen’s rules and regulations governing the sale of alcoholic beverages in restaurants require that any sale of alcohol be made in conjunction with the service of food. Through this ballot question, the Board of Selectmen seeks the input of the electorate on whether to modify this rule. The vote on this question will be advisory only and will not require the Board to change its rules.

Question 3. This is a non-binding question.

Do you favor increasing the number of stores in Arlington licensed to sell wine and malt beverages for consumption off-premises from three to five?

Summary of Question 3.

This is a non-binding public opinion advisory question placed on the ballot by majority vote of the Board of Selectmen. Currently, the Board of Selectmen, as the liquor licensing authority for the Town, is authorized to license up to three stores to sell wine and malt beverages for consumption off the premises. All three of these licenses have been issued. Through this ballot question, the Board of Selectmen seeks the input of the electorate on whether to pursue authorization for the issuance of two additional such licenses. The vote on this question will be advisory only and will not require the Board to take any action toward increasing the number of available off-premise licenses.

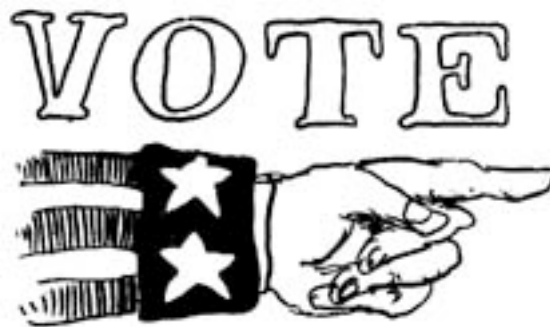
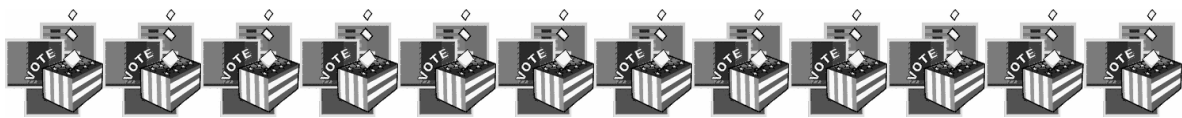
Question 4. This is a non-binding question.

Do you favor allowing stores in Arlington currently licensed to sell wine and malt beverages for consumption off-premises to sell all alcoholic beverages for consumption off-premises?

Summary of Question 4.

This is a non-binding public opinion advisory question placed on the ballot by majority vote of the Board of Selectmen. Currently, the Board of Selectmen, as the liquor licensing authority for the Town, is authorized to license up to three stores to sell wine and malt beverages for consumption off the premises. All three of these licenses have been issued. Through this ballot question, the Board of Selectmen seeks the input of the electorate on whether to pursue authorization to amend these licenses to allow the sale of all alcohol beverages. The vote on this question will be advisory only and will not require the Board to take any action toward changing the type of available off-premise licenses.

Occupation: Landscape Architect, President, Brown, Richardson & Rowe, Inc., Boston, Massachusetts

Qualifications: My qualifications for a second term as Selectmen start with my willingness to listen and to work hard for the Town of Arlington. My professional background in planning and construction will help the Town deal with its major development and infrastructure projects in the near future.

Question: How would you balance budget cuts while maintaining programs and still have an adequate Reserve Fund?

Arlington has a triple AAA bond rating because the Town is well managed fiscally. The Five Year Plan has worked. We have kept our promise to the voters to run the town well. We have not had tax increases during this period.

The outstanding work of our Finance Committee, in conjunction with the wise fiscal management of the Town Manager and Assistant Town Manager and the Selectmen, has meant that Arlington has a history of balancing the budget, of cutting when necessary and of maintaining our Reserve Funds. We will continue to do so. Because of this management, Arlington will not be cutting positions in 2009 as other towns are. We want to work with our employees in 2010. We want to level fund all positions to avoid layoffs. All town departments are cutting their 2010 budgets by the necessary 10%.

As we look to our next Five Year Plan, there are looming deficits in the years to come. This recession has meant that we can not automatically solve the problems of the next five years with an override. It just won't pass. We need to continue to look at the services we provide, and decide whether they are truly necessary.

Occupation: Selectman

Qualifications: 12-years experience as a Selectman, including 2-years as Chairman; Sub-committees: Community Development Block Grant, Budget & Revenue, Parking, Affordable Housing, New Revenue and serve as the Board liaison to the Transportation Advisory Committee; BA Degree in Business Management and over 30-years of business and management experience.

Question: How would you balance budget cuts while maintaining programs and still have an adequate Reserve Fund?

Over the past year, the recession has reduced the state's ability to provide local aid to cities and towns. In Arlington's case, Governor Patrick was forced to reduce local aid in the current fiscal year by more than \$900,000. For fiscal year 2010, the Governor's budget includes a further decrease in local aid of almost \$1.7 million. These reductions will seriously challenge the Town's ability to maintain local services. To minimize budget cuts, we must first look at all budgets and identify cost reductions that have the least impact on fundamental town services. Budget cuts should be implemented only after prioritizing town services. In addition, we must call on the legislature to support the proposed local option meals tax which would provide some diversification of local tax revenues. Further, we must continue the hiring freeze implemented earlier this year. As a last resort, we must consider implementing a one-year wage freeze for all town employees. While reserve funds will be necessary to help fund the fiscal year 2010 budget, we must recognize that the recession is likely to impact local aid for at least the next two years. Accordingly, we must act responsibly in using reserves to fund town budgets.

Qualifications: I have served as Assessor for the Town for 23 years. I am a member of the International, Middlesex County, and Massachusetts Association of Assessing Officers and a former Selectmen. As a practicing attorney I possess the statutory and tax knowledge related to property valuations, abatements and exemptions.

Question: *How would you improve openness and transparency with regard to the proceedings of the Board of Assessors?*

The Board of Assessors develops its operating principles to improve public access to information and documents. The Department maintains an active web sight with navigation tools and features to access a large number of informative items including a record of the assessment of every piece of property in the Town, Motor Vehicle Excise information, exemption information and a number of the forms to be used by taxpayers requesting abatements and exemptions.

The schedule for monthly Board Meetings is published and agendas are usually divided into four general categories:

New policies or guide lines issued by the State Department of Revenue; Motor vehicle excise issues regarding the approval of requested abatements; Office Management and administrative issues related to departmental budget matters, town meetings and planning for the next review cycle of property values; and The review and discussion of applications for

Abatements and Exemptions. This process is conducted in Executive session because of the confidential nature of the information.

Minutes of the meetings are promptly posted to the website once approved by the Board. Through these various resources, the Board maintains a regular and important dialogue with the taxpayers of Arlington creating accountability and transparency.

Qualifications: Arlington School Committee 2003 to present. Served on each subcommittee, helped develop six budgets, negotiated teacher and superintendent contracts, drafted many district policies, co-chaired override-fiscal stability campaign. Town Meeting Member since 2001. President, Friends of Spy Pond Park 2004-05. Developed 24 small, innovative high schools for low-income students across U.S.



Question: In tight budget times, the school committee has been forced to cut programs and raise user fees. Faced with similar choices, how would you prioritize what to keep? Would you consider adding new fees?

As a School Committee member, I have taken difficult votes to cut \$3 million from the district's budget during the past three years while keeping class sizes low, adding reading, math and science support programs at the elementary level, and increasing counseling services. If re-elected, my priorities will be to protect class sizes, maintain newly added support programs, ensure that quality teaching and learning appropriate for 21st century education takes place in core subjects, provide sufficient funding for high quality Art and Music programs, and provide quality education for accelerated and struggling learners.

Before cuts are made, we must be clear on what Arlington will receive in Title I, IDEA, and education block grants from the federal stimulus package, apply for every grant we can, cut administrative costs where possible, and reduce expenses by providing quality special education services in Arlington to replace some out-of-district placements.

I do not favor new fees but support increases in current fees equal to the rate the school budget increases next year. If forced to reduce teaching positions, something we must avoid at all costs, my priority will be to keep class sizes as low as possible for children in the early grades.



Cindy Starks

Occupation: Middle School Math Teacher

Qualifications: I am an energetic, collaborative problem solver committed to education with extensive volunteer experience ranging from organizing state level Stand for Children rallies to co-founding Arlington Enrichment Collaborative to elementary cafeteria monitoring. I have a Masters in Education, high-tech management experience and two children in the Arlington Public Schools.

Question: In tight budget times, the school committee has been forced to cut programs and raise user fees. Faced with similar choices, how would you prioritize what to keep? Would you consider adding new fees?

In this economy I cannot in good conscience raise any fees (other than for inflation) or add any new fees.

Before we cut anything, we must look for efficiencies to better use the money we have. Could an energy broker bring down electricity costs? Can we use less energy? Are there more functions we can combine within school and town departments as was done with IT?

Next we put everything on the table and ask ourselves what student needs are being met with this program? Can we serve more students if we do it differently, such as employing new techniques within the classroom rather than separate programs for different groups? Is this program cost effective and an efficient use of our funds? From struggling learners to gifted students, we must ensure we meet all students' needs equitably. Cutting bits and pieces of our children's education every time the budget slips, only results in a piecemeal education.

Longer term, we must up-level the budget discussions to the state house to request more funding, better tools to help towns fund education, and to create sustainable funding solutions to stop economic ups and downs from having such drastic effects on our children's education.

Joseph C. Tully

Occupation: Attorney

Qualifications: I have been a 15-year town meeting member. I am an attorney for a company with \$500 million budget. I have served on ad hoc town committees. My experience is in solving, not creating, problems. I ask critical questions and focus on the big picture, not a personal agenda.



Question: In tight budget times, the school committee has been forced to cut programs and raise user fees. Faced with similar choices, how would you prioritize what to keep? Would you consider adding new fees?

We have, at least, a third choice. By continually seeking efficiencies, we can try to mitigate areas where we would otherwise need to raise more revenue or cut expenses. For

example, I have suggested a Special Education Task Force that would study how other towns are coping with the cost of Special Education.

I have been approached with a suggestion to leverage the experience of our retired teachers as mentors.

I have also been a long time proponent of smart redistricting in a manner that does not affect families in mid-game. This plan would help maintain class sizes while providing savings. Further, we need to understand that fiscal responsibility means more than being able to balance pluses and minuses. Sound fiscal judgment is a subset of good overall judgment.

Fiscal responsibility means not exposing our budget to avoidable, non curriculum-related liability. Skyrocketing legal fees during a period of unprecedented fiscal crisis, is just one area where we can improve our bottom line. Squandering the equivalent of 20 or more teacher positions to pursue personal disputes is repugnant to our educational mission.

A budget that maximizes teachers, minimizes class size, and promotes lean administration, is a budget I can embrace.

Question: How would you improve communication between the Housing Authority and the tenants?

In the past three years, I am proud to say that we have: hired John Griffin as our new Executive Director; completed over \$12 million dollars in improvements and upgrades at Menotomy Manor; created and co-sponsored a Supervised Play Program with the Arlington Boys and Girls Club and the Arlington Recreation Department; improved the security and surveillance in all our Senior buildings; secured a \$66,000 HUD grant for our family self sufficiency program; expanded Operation Success' facilities; strengthened background checks; created the first combined independent living/housing program in the state for mentally retarded clients; and instituted environmental priorities for transportation and water conservation and much, much more.

Specific to tenant communications, we allow a representative from each building to take part in our meetings, meet regularly with the Council of Presidents and on a motion that I made

two years ago, we now rotate our meetings to be held in each of facilities to allow direct access by tenants to the board!

I believe that clear and frequent communication is the foundation for understanding, acceptance and tolerance.
