ATTENDANCE

My First Fun Fly – Bomb Drop Dome Golf

The first fun fly is over, and you all know who the winner was. What I would like to share with you is how a “newbie”, viewed from my prospective, saw this event unfold. This was my 1st fun fly that I would fly in. I guess you could call it my virgin contest. I would like to thank all the club members who helped me through this rough and self-doubting time. One person especially, who tutored me. I do not like to name names, so I will call him Jeff for the purpose of this article. Prior to the start of the event, I was given instructions, which were simple enough. Hook a wire bomb release into the tail of my killer contest winner aircraft, “the mighty Slow Stick”.

The bomb was simply a metal washer attached to a length of ribbon, about 10 inches long, fly straight and level after takeoff about 20 feet off the ground, approach the target and dive the plane slightly, pick up speed and apply up

elevator which will cause the bomb to jump off the release. Piece of cake!

My practice run was perfect until I heard “THE DREADED BOINK”. Over the target the plane dove, I gave up elevator, the bomb released and watching the bomb and the glowing ribbon attached to it going exactly where I wanted it to go and then I heard it, the BOINK, the sound an airplane makes as it makes a perfect one point landing, nose first into the ground. My mentor did not tell me to watch the plane and not the flowing ribbon bomb, although they arrived at the same time. I swear it was in slow motion, the bomb and in the corner of my eye the plane balanced on its nose, shuttering and the parts of the motor mount exploding and finally flipping over on its back, and a voice in the background (my mentor) telling me not to watch the bomb.

The final result, the contest had not started and my Slow Stick out of commission. My other plane was an Ultimate Biplane. This was going to be quite an experience. Having been involved in last summers fun fly golf ball bomb drop (only as a caddy) marking dropped balls, passing out the right clubs, checking distance and wind direction for the pilots and doing an outstanding job in general, I was awarded the caddy job for this event. Just great! I would have to be the first up on the flight line.

My Ultimate took off, flew straight and level and as I made my turn for the approach to the target, the bomb dropped off, the wall of the dome came out and grabbed my plane and pushed it to the ground about 200 feet from the target. The joint is haunted! There was nothing I could do but to take my golf shot from that distance. I could not see the flag and wondered what would Tiger do (Not Woods, but Tony. We all know him from the cereal commercials.)

I took a 7 iron, hit the ball and ended up 15 feet from the flag, hole high. If those darn blue barrels were not in the way, I might have sunk it! Three putts later, the ball went into the hole. Amen! My first round was over and 5 strokes was not all that bad. Now to attend to my duties as the caddy which went pretty well, until, I will call him Mikey, dropped his bomb 250 feet from the hole. I gave him the lucky 7 iron to use but he wanted to use the putter instead. I tried my best to convince him he was too far for a putter, but he insisted. So much for my expertise as a caddy. I was crushed. Mikey wound up and *CRACK*, the ball jumped off the ground. It flew as if he had used a 9 iron. In all my years I have never seen a putter that could do that. The gallery had gathered around the hole to watch and when they saw the ball coming, I saw all arms and legs churning to get out of the way. The ball Mikey hit must have been named Moses because it sure parted the gallery. Round one was over. Scores ranged from 3 to 7 strokes.

Round Two !!!

I was not going to let the mistakes I made from the 1st round occur again, so I added another washer to my bomb to keep it from falling off in a turn. The plane took off and as the wall of the dome came up, I made my turn and the bomb did not drop off. As the target came into view, I dove slightly on it, gave a little up elevator and this time I watched the plane. Perfect....except the bomb did not release. Back around again, dive, up elevator, same thing. One more time....the same result.

Now I was angry and I can hear in the background, "Loop it", "Roll it", "Invert it", all the maneuvers that I have only done when I lost control of the plane and the plane did them and not me, just before the BOINK occurred. Now I was so frustrated, the other wall of the dome came out, grabbed my plane and threw it to the ground and the bomb came off, this time about 25 feet from the hole. I did not even check my plane. I grabbed the putter, hit the ball and it hit another ball that was left on the ground. Total distance...5 feet. 20 feet to go. To make a long story short, 5 putts later and I was in the hole. A 7. Yuck!

No further excitement until, yep, Mikey came up, dropped his bomb 10 feet from the hole. I gave him the putter, pulled the flag from the pin and waited for him to putt out. Again in slow motion, I saw him wind up and wack the ball. He was only 10 feet away and his swing was good for about 100 feet. I remembered his previous shot and how the ball jumped off the ground. A quick calculation would put the ball about 32 inches in the air before it hit me in a very tender spot of my body so my hands moved to protect it. I will let you guess what I was protecting. Much to my surprise and relief, the ball came like a bullet along the ground, hit the rubber sole of my shoe and bounced back to 10 inches from the cup. In the background I hear, "You should have jumped up." At my age, jumping up

while protecting with both hands the
aforementioned tender spot, was not even
an option!

What did I gain from my first fun fly? \$2.50
to repair my Slow Stick, \$5 to fly at the

dome, \$3 to repair my Ultimate bipe and
memories to last a
lifetime....PRICELESS!!!
