Slo-Poke Race and Limbo

Tortoise wins! Hares lose. Winning Tortoise is **Jeff Peca** for the 'Odd's. **Dave West** for the 'Even's. **Jeff Peca** winner in the run-off flying his 'Blue Stick', which he built at the Jan. 2004 club meeting.

Two heats of 6 planes did their best to fly at stall speed or slower in an attempt to cross the finish line last. At the whistle, all pilots had 5 seconds to cross the starting line. A late start had a one-position penalty in the finish column. (If you were first, you dropped to second, etc.) After crossing the starting line, the plane had to fly left hand turn around the Dome back to the starting line, do not cross the starting line, turn 180 and make right hand turns around the Dome and cross the finish line. Last one over the finish line wins.

With half the pilots flying, the other half were judges watching for infractions such as touching the ground, zigzagging, late start, and finish position. The 'Odd's flew first (the names on the sign up sheet corresponding to the odd numbers of the sign up count) 'Even's were the judges. Then for the second heat, we reversed the

pilots and judges. Everybody was busy, all the time.

This kind of 'race' takes advantage of the physical limitations of the Dome, and puts your piloting skills to the test. You naturally tend to take the longest path to consume the most time and your natural tendency is to maintain flying speed plus. You learned a long time ago that when you fly too slowly, you fall out of the sky. Gravity is relentless. It does not care if you are beginner or expert, if it is windy or clam, race or no race. When you fly too slow, you stop flying, and gravity don't care what your excuse may be. In addition to the big 'G', there is traffic. Remember that there was a 180 turn in the race. That means that somewhere along the way, every plane

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meets every other plane in the race – head on! In theory, when you are flying really slowly, you have all kinds of time to avoid the other planes. As it happens, there were no mid-air collisions! Hooray for both the tortoises and the hares. This kind of ‘race’ is so different, it keeps everyone thinking and watching and laughing.

Next on the agenda was Limbo! Straightforward, no tricky stuff, fly under the tape between the poles, single elimination. 4 pilots wrecked planes during the Slo-Poke, and only 5 made the first limbo pass at 5 feet. The same 5 pilots made the 4-foot pass. 2 more dropped out at 3 feet, and none of the remaining 3 pilots made the 2-foot pass in two attempts. At 2 ½ feet, we eliminated **Skip Carrino** then another round at 2 ½ feet eliminated **Jeff Peca**, leaving the **winner of the limbo...DAVE WEST**.

Prize time had 12 club members signed up for the Barnstormers raffle. The fact that Dave, Jeff and Skip fought to a fine finish finalizing first flying feats means nothing. The first prize of anything on the table goes to the pilot whose number is drawn from the pill pool bottle. In this case, **Jeff Peca** proved he is not only skillful, but really lucky, and won the first choice on the table. The prizes were really neat, including a Coroplast “ORION” ARF kit donated by **Scott Hurley** to promote the SPADfest coming up in July, a Watt-Amp-Volt-mAh combination meter, and Digital tachometer.

April 30 was the last Dome night for this season. Indoor flying will resume again about November 3 at the Bensenville Golf Dome. Don’t let the foamies get all oily over the summer.
