PTO Highlights

The PTO meeting was held on Tues. Nov. 6th in the Cafeteria. The meeting included discussions on recent events, upcoming events, and fundraising and teacher allotments.

Principals Remarks:

Mr. White:
November 4th – Election Day for all there was no school. Teachers and Staff did work and participated in training seminars.

Friday November 7th will be the 4th grade Veteran's Day Celebration performance for the whole school and families.

Tuesday November 11th – School will be closed in honor of Veteran's Day

Wednesday November 12th is an early release day for parent teacher conferences. Students will be dismissed at 12:30 and lunch will be served. If parents cannot make the scheduled meeting, they are encouraged to send in a note to their child's teacher to schedule a mutually agreed upon time. Parents should always feel free to contact their child's teacher anytime throughout the school year.

Friday November 14th Term 1 report cards go home for

grades 1-5.

Student handbooks will be going home next week. They are a little later than usual due the many updates made this year. Parents are reminded to review the handbook with your children. Parents and students should sign and return the last page of the book to acknowledge the receipt and understanding of the handbook policies.

The new Woburn Schools Wellness Policy was discussed and clarified. The complete policy is on the Woburn Public Schools website. Attached is a shortened Reeves School version dated Sept 17, 2008. The main idea of the wellness policy is to promote healthy eating habits. Classrooms will have parties but on a limited basis and the school as a whole will look for alternatives for using food as a reward i.e. an extra ½ hour of recess. Mr. White reiterated that health habits at home will follow to school and thus he encouraged sending in healthy snacks for kids.

There was a discussion on the school lunch program. Mr. White and a committee of parents met with Food Service director Lisa Tour on November 6th to discuss how the new Card system is working and to review menu items, lunch times, quality and quantity of food provided etc.

Treasurers Report:

Steve Anastasi reported balances for the General, Library, and Playground Fund. PTO membership dues are still being collected. Thank you and welcome to all families that have joined the PTO. The membership drive will be extended until Thanksgiving. A separate notice will be sent out next week. Contact Information:

It cannot be stressed enough how important it is to have your emergency contact phone numbers updated. If you have a change in your home phone number or main number you use such as your cell, please inform the office immediately. Also, please give us more than one number (friends, relatives, neighbors, work). If need to get in touch with you in the case of an emergency and you are unavailable, we need alternative numbers.

Pre- School Screening:

A free pre-school screening for 3 and 4 year olds is conducted several times a year during the school year by the Pre-School Special Education Team. Next Screening is December 3rd.

The purpose of the screening

is twofold:

Children who may have special needs are identified early and provided with appropriate services to enable them to be better prepared for Kindergarten.

Children who are found to be typically developing are eligible for a drawing for placement in the 2009-2010 Pre-School Integrated Programs at the Shamrock School.

Pre- School at the Reeves

The Woburn Public Preschool, located at the Reeves School is a welcoming classroom to walk by each day. We thought there would be some interested parents who might benefit from knowing a little bit more about the Preschool.

First off, Miss Jane and Miss Maria are the teachers in the classroom every day. The children in the program are between the ages of 3 and 5 years of age. The hours of the morning session which is held every day Monday through Friday is from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. There are two afternoon sessions: Monday, Wednesday and Friday and the other is Tuesday and Thursday both are from 12:30 to 3:00.

Besides the Preschool at the Reeves there are also two other programs that Woburn offers which are located at the Shamrock Elementary School. These programs are the Title 1 Program and the Integrated Program.

Miss Jane and Miss Maria's philosophy that they follow in teaching the children is to provide the children with experiences that stimulate learning and the curriculum that is planned is to develop positive feelings toward learning. After several location changes, the preschool moved to the Reeves in the fall of 2006. Miss Jane and Miss Maria told us that the entire Reeves community has welcomed them with open arms and they are very happy and thrilled to be here.

Miss Jane has always taught preschool and this is her eighth year in the Woburn Public Schools. She is a

lifelong Woburnite and lives with her husband, Peter and two daughters, Shalen and Stephanie and her dog, Holly. In her spare time she loves to travel, read and spend time with her family.

Miss Maria has been with the Woburn Public Preschool for 12 years. The kids could color or make bracelets or just visit with their classmates while enjoying a snack before the Halloween Laser Spooktacular show presented by Prismatic Magic. We raffled off 35 N.E.D. yo-yo's and 2 shining stars donated by Valerie Long. Thank you to the Newcomb, Barretto and Grace families who stayed until after 9:00 to help clean up! Thank you also to Mr. White for supporting this event. The Enrichment Committee would like to thank Alison Moore for once again securing a grant from the Lahey Clinic for two anti-smoking enrichment programs. In June of 2009, Slim Goodbody Productions will present the Musical Health Show to all students at the Reeves. This is a fifty minute program of song, dance, movement and lots of audience participation. It teaches the fundamentals of anatomy, nutrition, fitness, personal hygiene and making smart choices about smoking. It is designed to promote self-respect and motivate children to be the best they can be. Also, later this year, students will be entertained by Jim "The Spoon Man" Cruise as he plays two
