Please be prepared to stand up and say a few words about what you brought in. We all want to learn...that's why we attend these meetings!



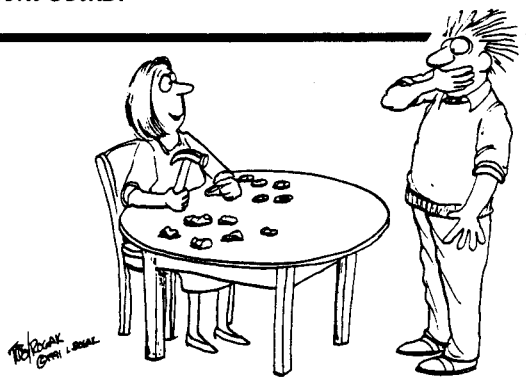
