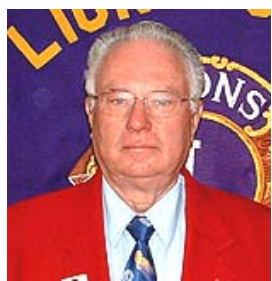

A message from the District Governor - - -



This month I will dedicate this column for one purpose and one purpose only and that is the state of membership in our district. Since July 1st of this year many of the clubs have been working overtime in bringing in new members to the association. On the other hand we have been losing members faster than we can bring them in. That means that at the moment we have a negative balance in membership from what we began the year with. Unless we do something about it we will continue on that spiral path to the point we may not have enough members to continue as a separate district and if it continues far enough we will not be able to sustain ourselves in the State.

Last year we finished the year with fifty-seven members less than what we had at the beginning of the year. One does not have to use a lot of math to figure out that with these increased losses there is a financial burden that is placed on everyone else.

So what are we to do about it. I see two things that all clubs need to consider doing. The first is to take a hard look before deciding to drop a Lion. We need to give our members every consideration, and I am sure that many of the clubs do, before we remove them from the books. What we may want to look at is providing preventive measures, such as a personal contact, with the member before we drop him/her. Are we dropping the members because they have missed a few meetings or that because you assume they no longer want to be a member? Have you considered placing a member in the Member-at-Large category until they can recover from whatever it is that is causing them to miss meetings and or projects. The idea is to consider all aspects of a member's case prior to dropping them from the roles.

The second thing we all have to do is to increase our desire to have more lions within our clubs. I say this because only the membership, including myself, can ask a person to join our organization. We need to step up our efforts and simply ask more of our daily contacts if they would be interested in joining the largest service organization in the world. Over the years we have proven that we can do anything we want once we put our minds and souls together and set some goals. I am asking each and every member of District 44-N to consider what is happening with our decreasing membership and to rally your respective clubs into making this year one that has a positive growth rather than a negative one.

A Little Talk From VDG Terri McGrew



Did you know the NH Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation started in 1978 with contributions from a few Lions who were passionate about helping others?

Approximately twenty years later with the help of New Hampshire Lions fund-raising efforts, the endowment reached \$500,000 and we began to draw from the interest. Since then we have been supplying eye glasses and hearing aids to those in need.

Ten years ago 70% of our requests were for eye glasses and 30% for hearing aids. Today those numbers are reversed and 70% of our requests are for hearing aids. The cost of hearing aids is much greater than glasses so the NH Lions Sight & Hearing Foundations needs our help more than ever.

This year we will draw approximately \$36,000 from interest and expect to receive additional funds from the Haunted House, Melvin Jones and Granite State Fellowships, Mint sales, Wishing Well donations, the Annual Eye Ball and Twin State Soccer.

In 2006 the NH Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation has already helped fifty individuals with hearing aids and eye glasses and purchased a new digital camera for each district for Operation KidSight. The Foundation needs additional funding to continue to provide quality services throughout NH.

Each time your club supports one of these fund-raisers or makes a contribution directly to the Foundation, you are making it possible for the Lions to make a difference in someone's life and improve the quality of their life. Please give generously of your time and resources so we can continue this wonderful tradition.

NH MD44 Health Services Board Eye Clinics

Hello Everyone,

With the possibility of starting a new eye clinic in the Rochester area I have made many calls to clubs requesting information on the number of clients they have funded for eye exams over the past 3 years. As of this article I have only heard back from two clubs but that is defiantly not enough information to format what amount of usage a clinic would have if put in that area.

This notice is to ask any club that is interested in the possibility of a clinic in the Rochester area to please contact me and we can discuss what information I am looking for before I can go forward with this project. At this time it is really at a standstill and I feel that is a shame. If there are numbers out there to support starting a clinic over there I need to have that information before I will approach doctors or search for a location.

I work during the day but you can certainly leave a message as I return all calls each evening. Please, take a moment to address this situation and get me some information so that I can pursue the possibility of a new clinic. I feel this is an important project and that many clubs should be able to make use of getting an eye exam for free so please....let's talk.

I am also willing to meet with any clubs' eye care screener or the entire club to discuss the steps to follow in order to use either of the existing clinics in Manchester or Concord. I am only a phone call away.

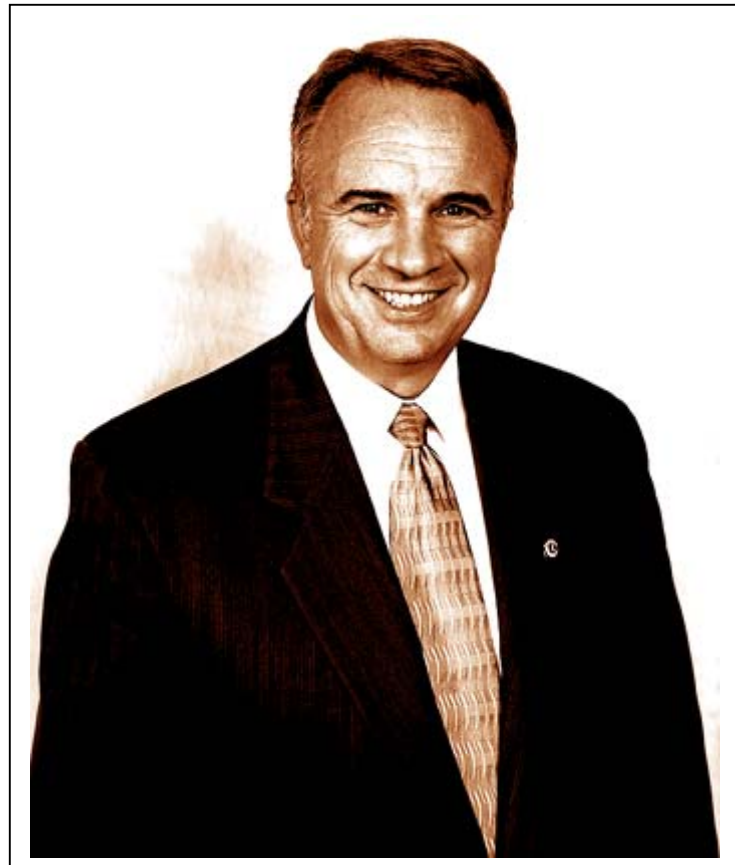

Albert F. Brandel of Melville, New York, USA,, was elected to serve as second vice president of The International Association of Lions Clubs at the Association's 89th International Convention held in Boston, Massachusetts, USA, June 30th through July 4th, 2006.

Vice President Brandel is a retired police detective.

He has been a member of the West Hempstead Lions Club since 1975, and an associate member of the Melville Lions Club. Vice President Brandel has held many offices in the association, including

club president and district governor and has sponsored 42 new members. He has also served as a presenter and a panelist at USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forums and worked with the Long Island Lions Eye Bank as a transporter. He has been the Lions Representative to UNICEF in New York for 10 years and has helped coordinate Lions and LCIF relief efforts at the World Trade Center following September 11, 2001.

In recognition of his contributions, Vice President Brandel has received numerous awards, including the 100% Club President Award, the 100% District Governor Award, the Supreme Extension Award, a 30 member Key, 12 International President's Awards and Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest award the association grants to its members. He is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lion Activities, Vice President Brandel has served as a Little League volunteer and is active in his church as a Eucharistic minister. He is a former member of the board of directors of the United Nations Association of the USA.

Vice President Brandel's wife, Dr. Maureen Murphy, an anesthesiologist and a Lion, is now practicing at a community hospital.
