Another time, Paula's father Don was taken to Cottonwood Hospital unconscious with an infection and the nurse was trying unsuccessfully to insert the intravenous needle into his arm for needed antibiotics. Paula was sitting on the other side of the bed and she reached out to the nurse who handed her the intravenous equipment and Paula easily inserted the needle successfully on her first try. Paula died about one week later.

Paula worked nine years at the LDS Hospital Emergency Room and was qualified as a Trauma I Nurse. She also worked in the Emergency Rooms of The Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas while she also worked as an attorney there, and at St. Marks Hospital in Salt Lake City before she became General Counsel for the Utah Medical Association. She liked to keep up on medical practices while she worked as an attorney by working part time at ERs.

Professional Life

After completing Law School, she was hired by Pezzulli and Associates, Dallas, Texas where she worked for two years and won a million-dollar lawsuit for her law firm. She then returned to Utah and became General Counsel for the Utah Medical Association where she worked until her death.
